Dear Parents,

Last Sunday, 11th November 2018 we acknowledged the Centenary of the Armistice, ending the conflict of the First World War.



At 11 am on 11 November 1918 the guns on the Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. The allied armies had driven the invading forces back. In November the Germans called for an armistice - the suspension of fighting, in order to secure a peace settlement.

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month attained a special significance in the post-war years. It became universally associated with the remembrance of those who had died in the war. More than 330,000 Australians served overseas during the Great War. More than 60,000 of them had died.

Australians across the country marked the Centenary of the Armistice and observed one-minute's silence at 11am in memory of those who died or suffered in the First World War and all wars and armed conflicts since.

For us as a people of faith, it is a time to commit again to the *God of Peace* and recognise the effects that conflict has on each of us, our families and our world. Living our faith in action, the principles of the Gospel and Catholic Social Teaching recognise that:

"Peace is built up day after day, in the pursuit of an order willed by God, and can flourish only when all recognise that everyone is responsible for promoting it. Peace is the fruit of Justice and the fruit of Love."



Today is **World Kindness Day.** World Kindness Day is celebrated annually on 13th November. Today the students were asked to make the world a better place by celebrating and promoting good deeds and pledging acts of kindness. As a school that prides itself on the Gospel values with our motto 'Love one another as I have loved you –John 13:34 not only through words or speech but with action and in truth.' 1 John 3:18, today is an important day to remind us of our duty as Catholics who walk in Jesus' footsteps everyday.

World Kindness Day was first launched in 1998 by The World Kindness Movement, an organisation formed at a 1997 Tokyo conference of like-minded kindness organisations from around the world. There are currently over 28 nations involved in The World Kindness Movement. The mission of the World Kindness Movement and World Kindness Day is to create a kinder world by inspiring individuals and nations towards greater kindness.

To the community of Mary, Queen of the Family Parish,

Our community of Mary, Queen of the Family Parish is called at all times to share and grow our faith in Jesus Christ. Our priestly ministry seeks to serve this mission, so like the widow of this week's Gospel, we can offer the gift of our whole life as a faithful disciple.

A key aspect of our discipleship, is our willingness to *listen to what the Spirit is saying* as is evident in our journey towards Plenary Council. Pope Francis has been promoting greater listening and dialogue in our Church since the start of his papacy and Bishop Vincent likewise encourages this practice in our Diocese.

At Mary Queen of the Family Parish we seek to model this listening and dialogue in our community and through our collaborative leadership. Through this listening, our goals of *Welcome, Grow and Act* have come to life. An opportunity now arises for an expansion of our parish leadership model.

Bishop Vincent has appointed a team of priests to serve our parish, including Fr Regie Lavilla MSP, (moderator) and Fr John Paul Escarlan. A third priest and member of the team will be appointed shortly. All three priests will reside at the presbytery in Allawah Street.

What is different about this team of priests? Most commonly, a Parish Priest is appointed and any assistant priests directly support the Parish Priest. In this alternative team model, one of the priests is the "moderator" (essentially the team leader or the 'first among equals') and each priest in the team will have equal responsibilities and rights for the pastoral care of the parish.

Bishop Vincent has introduced this team of priests because he recognises our parish offers a strong example of collaboration in our existing leadership and through our ongoing listening and dialogue. He wants to support our current efforts through our goals of *Welcome, Grow, Act* and this new team of priests has been briefed on what is currently happening in our parish, our plans and dreams, and is keen to support and build upon what is happening already.

Fr Luis and I would like to express our thanks for the privilege of sharing ministry over the years.

I warmly welcome Fr Regie who will be joining us from 8 December, and commences his ministry officially on 1 January. Fr John Paul will arrive at the beginning of the New Year.

Let us pray for Fr Regie and Fr John Paul as they prepare to join our community, and pray for one another as we prepare to step forward into the next stage of our journey of faith.

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

Why developing empathy in your child matters

Parenting is a socialisation process during which parents develop in their children and teenagers the skills and attitudes that will enable them to fit into the different groups they encounter. These groups will exist inside the classroom, in friendship groups, during sports and leisure activities and elsewhere.

This socialisation process needs to begin from a young age.

Initially, most kids believe that their world and everyone in it revolves around them. "I want" is their mantra. Patient, firm parents will continually remind children that they need to think of others. "It's your brother's turn.""Nana doesn't feel comfortable listening to that language." "Think about how your behaviour affects others." These are the types of appeal to a less self-centred approach that many parents make.

The socialisation process operates on two levels. On one level its focus is on teaching and helping kids to follow social rules or conventions that exist to help them get along with each other. At a deeper level successful socialisation develops empathy in a child or young person.

Empathy – the ability to understand how another person is feeling or how they respond to a behaviour or an event – is the basis of all respectful relationships. Without empathy it's impossible for someone to enjoy a relationship based on respect and equality. It's easy for a person who doesn't practise empathy to reject, bully, intimidate or hurt someone else.

Empathy learned in childhood carries on to adult life

Empathetic adults enjoy better personal relationships and experience less stress. They also make better leaders who are more likely to get the best out of people than self-centred, result-focused leaders.

Anecdotal evidence suggests that empathy, if neglected in childhood, can be difficult to develop in adulthood. In some adults it takes a traumatic event or a 'road-to-Damascus' moment for them to adopt an empathetic perspective.

So, rather than wait until adulthood, let's focus on developing empathy in your children and adolescents. There is a good chance they will benefit very soon in terms of enjoying better friendships, improved wellbeing and more success at school. Here are five ideas to get you started:



- 1. Model empathetic behaviour. Be kind even though the person in front of you in that queue is slow.
- 2. Read fiction stories to kids or encourage them to read fiction. People who read fiction score highest on tests that ask them to infer other people's thoughts and emotions.
- 3. Praise kind and compassionate behaviours. The behaviours that parents focus on, even with teenagers, are those that tend to expand, so bring their empathetic behaviours to the fore.
- 4. Validate your child's feelings. When a child shares difficult stories or emotions let them know you understand, without offering solutions or advice.
- 5. Invite your child to walk in someone else's shoes. Occasionally ask your child a question like, "What would it be like to be feel tall like Tanya?"

Empathy is too important to wait until adulthood so make it a priority to develop a sense of 'other' in your child from an early age.
